Growing with letters & numbers



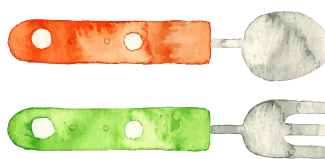
Repeat words or phrases from favourite stories, rhymes or songs

Say some numbers in a sequence, compare quantities and select small number of objects from group when prompted

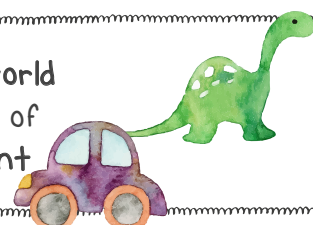


Make their first attempts at writing and experiment with colours when drawing (maybe drawing themselves or other people they know)
